SHE SAID BOOM - THIS WEEK!



<u>SHE SAID BOOM: THE STORY OF FIFTH COLUMN</u> screens 7pm Thursday 24 April as a fundraiser for Perv Film Festival, returning this November.

SHE SAID BOOM is the story of a group of young female artists from Toronto in the early eighties. They united to use music, film, and self publication to defy conventions of art practice, gender ideas, and to challenge homophobia. These endeavors snowballed into global art and political movements. By compiling hundreds of photos and archival super8 film footage, this film looks at their work, and explores why you may not have heard of them, despite their impact.

Featuring interviews with Fifth Column members Caroline Azar, Beverly Breckenridge and G.B. Jones, along with other collaborators including Bruce LaBruce, Vaginal Davis and Kathleen Hanna. Their legendary fights were a critical part of a tremendous body of work and way of life that waged total war against art practice, gender norms, and politics.
