## **Projecting the Body**


Directed by Walter McIntosh Australia, 2007, 55 mins

**■**ilmmaker Stephen Cummins blazed a trail through the turbulent 1980s, examining oppression, desire, and the politics of sexuality. Reacting against the environment of AIDS paranoia and ensuing homophobia, Cummins created films that are bold

in their politics and beautiful in their poetry. Projecting the Body is an intimate look at Cummins' life and career, bringing together his film and photographic work, rare home movies and snapshots as well as interviews with

Projecting the Body director, Walter McIntosh and producer, Sophie Harper are guest curators at this year's queerDOC festival. They will present a retrospective collection of Cummins' work, from rare experimentations and collaborations, to his more influential short films



## **John Waters: This Filthy World**

Directed by Jeff Garlin USA, 2006, 86 mins

"was the only kid in the audience who didn't understand why Dorothy would ever want to go back to that black and white farm and those smelly animals, when she could live with winged monkeys and magic shoes and gay lions."

The director of Hairspray, Cry Baby, Pecker, Pink Flamingoes, Dirty Shame and many other filth-cinema classics is an accomplished raconteur with a very witty outlook. In This Filthy World, Waters leads us on a trip down memory lane, from his early hobby films of the '60s, to his greatest accomplishments in trash. He covers a diverse array of subjects ranging from the home life of Michael Jackson to what it is like to attend children's matinees alone when you look like a child molester. John Waters is as



entertaining and outrageous in person as any of his bizarre and fabulous characters. This is surely the most shamelessly funny film at queerDOC this

year. As the Edinburgh Film Festival said "You'll laugh, you'll cheer, and once or twice you'll feel extremely sick."



Fiona and her partner Kellie long to have a child and believe they have found the man to make it happen. Darren. He's gay, he works with Fiona, has an unshakable desire to be a father, and is not put off by the sight of a specimen cup. It all sounds perfect... but as the complex dynamics of this very modern family begin to take shape, things soon turn from perfect to pear-shaped. As this riveting documentary progresses towards delivery-date, we find ourselves living every complexity of parenting when there are 2 Mums & A Dad.

We've now become familiar with the term 'intersex' but what does it really mean? One in 2000 explores the lives of people who are born with an anatomy that cannot be defined by the limited standards of 'male' and 'female'. This insightful film interweaves personal accounts with disconcerting 1950s educational films stories of infant gender reassignment surgery, with the plight of parents who are forced to make a decision about their little 'boy' or 'girl'. A doco duo to remind us that every child is unique and innocent, no matter how they came to be here, nor what package they arrived in.

Directed by Poppy Stockell Australia, 2007, 56 mins


#### Freeheld

This is a session for the romantics. These two lesbian love stories pay tribute to the passion and perseverance of star-crossed

Sydney filmmaker Poppy Stockell decided to film her search for love after creating a profile on a lesbian website She was somewhat surprised to find the girl she "clicked" with was Sandeep Virdi, an

Anglo-Indian Sikh living in the British Midlands. The distance was not the only problem; Sandeep had not come out to her very conservative family. The two years that Searching 4 Sandeep covers are sometimes heartbreaking, sometimes joyous and sometimes fraught with the loneliness of separation, but it is always frank and thoroughly engrossing.



The quietly devastating Freeheld has won a number of awards for Best Short Documentary. This is the story of Laurel Hester, a New Jersey police officer in the final stages of terminal lung cancer fighting to leave her pension fund to her domestic


partner, Stacie, While she faces down an unthinkably heartless pension board. she finds overwhelming support in her co-workers and community, who speak up for a committed officer whose only wish is to live, and die, like anyone else.


## **SEMPER FI: One Marine's Journey**

Directed by Vince DiPersio USA, 2007, 76 mins




Would you put your life on the line for a country that won't let you speak about your relationships? Jeff Key did, and he has plenty to say about the experience. At 6ft 4 inches and square jawed, patriotic, with impeccable southern manners. he is the perfect soldier. Born in homophobic rural Alabama and schooled in the Church of Christ, he moved from his hometown to Hollywood where he found freedom, acceptance and deep friendships. After 9/11, and at the age of 34, Jeff shocked all of his friends by joining the Marines. He fought

in Iraq because he believed it was the right thing to do, even though it meant returning to the closet. As he became increasingly disillusioned with the conflict, America's occupation of the Middle East and the pressures of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" Jeff had to make a choice - the love of your country or the love of your fellow man. Semper FI has won Best Documentary at three queer film festivals. Jeff Key has written and starred in a one-man show, The Eyes Of Babylon about his time in Iraq and parts of this show are featured in the film.

Director Marc Klasfield has moved from making music videos for Beyonce, Backstreet Boys and Eminem to follow seven contestants as they prepare for the International Mr. Bear contest in San Francisco. The film kicks off with John Caldera, winner

of the first contest in 1992, talking about the rise of Bear culture, then it gets down and personal with the up and coming cubs. Think 'behind the scenes at Miss Universe' but for fur-bellied gay men instead.

Whether you yourself identify as a Bear, enjoy a good bearhunt from time to time, or are just looking to dip a paw in the bear-pit, this is a fabulous introduction to one of our community's fastest arowing subcultures.



## Darling! The Pieter-Dirk Uys Story

Directed by Julian Shaw Australia / South Africa, 2007, 54 mins




"When I was 15 years old I saw a show that changed my life..." begins Sydney-born Julian Shaw. The show was one man, Pieter-Dirk Uys on the Opera House stage, the character, Evita Bezuidenhout. Within two years, while still completing high school, Shaw travelled to South Africa to begin making a documentary on Uys, one of the world's most controversial yet adored political satirists. The result is a truly remarkable debut. Uys permits Shaw access to his previously off-limits inner world, reviewing a life spent fighting the inhumanity of apartheid, endearing himself to celebrity status in his female

alter-ego, and dodging death threats.

In the era following apartheid's fall, Uys has a new mission, travelling to schools speaking to children about HIV/AIDS through an educational cabaret act. His performances are mesmerising, revealing the tremendous spirit of a man Desmond Tutu calls a friend and Nelson Mandela names as his hero.

#### **RED WITHOUT BLUE**


Dir Brooke Sebold, Benita Sills and Todd Sills US, 2007, 74 mins

This winner of Best Documentary awards at seven film festivals, both queer and mainstream, is an absolute must see. Mark and Alex Farley are identical twin brothers from a Christian Scientist family. They grow up with an incredible bond that is threatened when Alex takes them both out of the closet at junior high school. Through their tumultuous teens the boys are separated, and a new stress on their relationship is in play when they are reunited

two years later. Alex has decided to gender transition into Clair.

The compelling Red Without Blue was shot over a three-year period by filmmakers who had a close relationship to the family. This helps the film achieve an incredible intimacy that is missing from many documentaries. An unforgettable story of the connection we share with family, how it draws us together, and can tear us apart. See it with a sibling.

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
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
