







Festival Welcome

It's 2020 and the festival, and the world at large, is ever evolving. Queer Screen's 27th Mardi Gras Film Festival expands its reach this year, as we return to Sydney's Inner West, with over 20 screenings at Dendy Newtown, along with one night north of the harbour at Hayden Orpheum, and the bulk of the festival with our Principal Venue Partner, Event Cinemas George Street.

We have six World Premieres, over 90 Australian Premieres, and more films and sessions than last year. One of the most exciting things to emerge is the diversity of story and genre, with sci-fi, thriller, mystery and animation films featuring. Queer Scream, a program strand on queer horror films is a first for the festival and includes arguably the most fun film in the program, transgender and lesbian vampire flick, *Bit*.

We also have plenty of Australian talent on display and I'm thrilled to be opening the festival with a locally made feature for the first time in the festival's 27 year history - the heartfelt romantic comedy Ellie & Abbie (& Ellie's Dead Aunt).

One of the most buzz-worthy films on the festival circuit, *And Then We Danced*, sparked scenes of violent protest in its home country of Georgia and is our Centrepiece feature.

And if you only watch one animated film this year (or ever), make it the bittersweet *Top 3*. Trust me, add it to your list of top three films not to be missed!



Directed by Levan Akin | Georgia, Sweden, France | Georgian with English subtitles | 105 mins | 15+ $\,$

One of the most acclaimed LGBTIQ+ films of 2019, *And Then We Danced* is a powerful film about rivalry, desire and defiance. Goal-oriented Merab (an astonishing Levan Gelbakhiani) wants nothing more than to dance with the National Georgian Ensemble and has trained most his life for the honour. But all this is thrown into chaos when he falls for the carefree and rebellious newcomer Irakli (Bachi Valishvili). With an eclectic soundtrack that inspires a seductive dance scene to Robyn's *Honey*, Georgian-Swedish director Levan Akin's film sparked wild scenes of protest outside cinemas in Georgia when it screened. Olivia

Directed by Jacqueline Audry | France | French with English subtitles | 95 mins | 15+

A simultaneously weird and fascinating film, *Olivia* tells the story of a young student's infatuation with her teacher. The pupils at this flamboyant French boarding school are divided by their affections for either Miss Julie or Miss Cara. When new girl Olivia arrives, her adoration is immediately coveted by both teachers. However, it soon becomes clear that Olivia's desires are directed at only one of them. This 4K restoration of the 1951 French classic brings to life the bizarre subtleties and tension-filled innuendo of queer representation in this period.

Taxi Zum Klo

Directed by Frank Ripploh | West Germany | German with English subtitles | 98 mins | R18+

Taxi Zum Klo (1980) is an audacious queer classic from Germany, which upon release created a stir because of its uninhibited depiction of gay sex. The film tells the story of Frank, a dedicated high school teacher who cruises Berlin's public toilets at night seeking anonymous thrills. Along the way, he falls in love with the sensitive and monogamous Bernd. Will Frank's voracious sexdrive derail this fledgling relationship? Restored to 2K digital, Taxi Zum Klo's explicit sexuality and enduring themes of monogamy and fidelity in gay relationships make it as provocative and fresh as ever, forty years after its premiere.

Directed by Brad Michael Elmore | USA | English | 90 mins | 18+

Fans of *Buffy* and *D.E.B.S* will revel in this queer, lesbian vampire film about what it means to belong. Laurel (transgender actress Nicole Maines, *Supergirl*) is graduating high school and moving to LA to crash on her brother's couch and sample the nightlife. Of course it is here that she falls in with a group of lesbian vampires, for whom the only rule is to never turn a man, because they can't be trusted with power. *BIT* has a gritty, 90s aesthetic but is set today, and Laurel's journey as a young woman finding her place in a new city, albeit with vampires, is compelling, moving, sexy and most importantly, wildly entertaining.

Against the backdrop of Reagan-era USA, a closeted young actor, Mark Patton, lands the lead in the hotly anticipated *A Nightmare on Elm Street 2: Freddy's Revenge*. Upon its release, it quickly earned infamy as 'the gayest horror film ever made' for its homoeroticism, and effectively ended the promising young actor's career. This fascinating documentary explores the film's subsequent cult status and its firm place in the pantheon of queer horror, and traces Patton's defiant return to Tinseltown to embrace his legacy as horror cinema's first gay male scream queen.

In 1995, Malik (Jeffrey Bowyer-Chapman, *UnREAL*) and Aaron move from Chicago to small-town America with their teenage daughter, but there's something unnerving about their overly friendly new neighbours. After someone breaks in and spray-paints homophobic graffiti on their wall, Malik must reckon with past traumas as he tries to prove Rusty Creek is not what it seems. But how far is he willing to go to unravel the truth and protect his family, as his own life begins to spiral out of control? A chilling and timely addition to the queer horror canon.

Ruggedly handsome Yoav is having a midlife crisis. Everything around him reminds him of his age, from the wrinkles on his face, his fifteenth anniversary with boyfriend Dan, to seemingly everyone in his life deciding to settle down and have kids, including best friend Alma. The last thing he wants is to be a daddy - in either sense of the word - but when it becomes clear he and Dan want different things, Yoav must confront his inner demons as his life begins to unravel around him.

With Earth now uninhabitable, luxury space cruise ship *Aniara* transports people to a new life on Mars. Bisexual crew member MR oversees a sentient computer that helps keep passengers calm but few use it, until the *Aniara* veers off-course without immediate means of righting its path. Overwhelmed by demands to soothe people's anxiety over an uncertain future, MR seeks out companionship in beautiful but standoffish Isagel. Exploring the personal impact of tragedy through an epic sci-fi lens, *Aniara* is a sometimes grim but gripping film that will stay with you long after the credits roll.

Their life built as Enrique is put into jeopardy as rumours spread and suspicions arise within the community, spurred by his sympathies to the slave trade rebellion. Sexuality, gender identity and systems of oppression collide in this sweeping historical retelling of the life of Enrique Faber, subject of the most scandalous gender trial in colonial Cuban history.

This serendipitous relationship unfolds in a nonlinear fashion in three parts. Lucio Castro's sensual film captures the romanticism of a balmy European summer, and explores the role of fate and chance in our 22 sexual encounters. Is this just a summer fling or are they meant for each other?

Directed by Bani Khoshnoudi I Dominican Republic, Greece, Mexico, USA | English, and Spanish & Persian with English subtitles | 87 mins | 15+ Ramin has landed in the Mexican port city of Veracruz, lost on his way to Europe after fleeing persecution in Iran. With a boyfriend back home, Ramin is desperate to return to Tehran, but with little money finds himself stuck in the transitory city. In between learning Spanish from his sweet and lonely landlady, and working menial jobs, he meets the enigmatic Guillermo, whose tales of gang life and scarred body belies the growing closeness between the two men. A stunning love story of two women trapped by war and circumstance in Naziera Czechoslovakia. Shot on location at the historic Villa Tugendhat in th Czech Republic, this film captures the unwavering hope of love as seen through the eyes of Hana (Carice van Houten, Game of Thrones) and Liesel (Hanna Alström, Kingsman) who share an intense friendship which frequently verges on more. Based on Simon Mawer's Booker Prize-shortlisted novel of the same name, in turn based loosely on the lives of the Tugendhat family, this era-spanning 24 film is a historical, visual feast.

The Ground Beneath My Feet

Lola, portrayed with impeccable iciness by the exceptional Valerie Pachner, is torn between two German cities. Rostock for a high pressure job and an illicit, hotel-room-bound affair with her boss, Elise. And Munich, as guardian for her unstable and suicidal older sister, Conny. When she receives a series of mysterious calls from her sister, Lola begins to question her own sanity and finds herself on a one-way path to oblivion that she may not be able to escape. The stark environs and nuanced performance from Pachner serve up a tense, careful and provocative film.

Set against Trump-era immigration anxieties, Lingua Franca is a mesmerising portrait of just some of the struggles facing the transgender community. 




